Since I was selected as the President of the POA in February, things have been very busy. The pool is started and is still on schedule for a Grand Opening on May 28, 2011. The weather has not been cooperating lately and it must stop raining if we are to achieve that finish date. We remain optimistic that the date will be realized. Pool furniture has been ordered, a concession supplier has been selected, and the bath house is being constructed on time. We believe that the splash area, baby pool, and the main pool will be a great addition to our community and residents will thoroughly enjoy spending time at the pool. The concession stand, "Dockside," will have food, drink, and ice-cream, not only for the pool attendees, but also will have a food access window for all those people who do not use the pool, but want to have an ice cream cone or some other food selection while outside the pool area.

The Board of Directors is working hard to attend to the needs of the community. Some of the issues that are in the investigation stage are: Roads, Boat Ramp, Rules, Mini Barns, Signage and Restaurant. Each of these issues has a Board Champion that will investigate it and bring a recommendation to the Board some time this year. Of course, all the "day to day" issues continue to be addressed by the Board membership on a monthly basis.

We continue to have vandalism in our community. In mid April, someone threw several "rip rap" stones into the activity door and broke out the windows. The POA is offering a \$500 reward for information leading to the arrest of the persons who did this act. Please contact Charlie Beard at the office (386-7447) if you have any information on this incident. Additionally, other activities have occurred that remind us that we must all be vigilant and use our Neighborhood Watch and Sheriff's Department to report vandalism and crimes in the community.

The spring and summer's activities will continue to be exciting for our community. The Easter Egg Hunt, Garage Sale, Tox-a-way Day, July 4th Fireworks, Feast & Ski, Breakfast at the Marina, Concerts at the Park, Fishing Contests, and many other activities make Heritage Lake "the place" to be. We are fortunate to have an active community, organized by the many volunteers, to make our lives more fulfilling. We need to thank all those who make these activities happen.

I will continue to use this forum to communicate to the residences of Heritage Lake on an "as needed" basis. Please do not hesitate to bring any issue you have to the attention of the Board. Health and Fitness Corner CHILDREN, FITNESS AND HEALTH

As we look around today many of our children are out of shape. Our children are the future. Studies have suggested that we parents will live longer lives than many of our children. Many children are being diagnosed with chronic diseases that were once adult diseases. What can we do to stop this trend? We can be positive examples and involve our children in physical activities, while nurturing our relationships with them.

We need to be **INTENTIONAL** about finding ways to involve our children in physical fitness activities.

Here are a few ideas to get you started ~ Take your children to McCloud Nature Park for a hike, or walk on our walking trail here at Heritage Lake by the Maintenance building. If you go into town add 30 minutes or so to your trip and visit Avon Park behind the town hall for Frisbee golf, in-line skating or walk/run while the kids skate or ride a scooter along side of you. You could go for a hike at Washington Park in Avon or stop by Ellis Park in Danville and search for crawdad's in the creek and follow the trail into Blanton Woods to look at nature.

Heritage Lake has tennis courts, Pickle Ball, volleyball, horseshoe pits, basketball courts, park equipment or you could toss the Frisbee in your own yard. Be creative and play with your children~you could toss a ball or play kick the can!

Try to get in a minimum of 30 minutes a day of physical activity with your children.

Another component of health is a nutritious eating plan. I challenge you for the next thirty days to make one positive change in what your family is eating.

You could switch out sugary snacks for sweet fruits. I like to keep a bowl of fruit in sight or a veggie tray on the table, so that my family can just grab something if they feel the need to eat. You could also prepare sandwich baggies with veggie sticks, fruit slices, trail mix or nuts for taking with you when you are on the run. This will help you to not be tempted to purchase junk food while you are out. Involve your young children in preparation time and they are more likely to want to eat what you have readied. Remember to make it pleasant and fun if possible...not a chore. If you don't have time to prepare something ahead of time~bananas, apples and oranges are already packaged for you! Another great idea is to stop at the grocery store instead of a fast food place and check out the produce section. They have prepared fruit and vegetable containers and miniature containers of hummus and peanut butter. One of my favorite and filling snacks is to have a small bag of baby carrots with hummus or nut butter. This is available at the store or in your kitchen and it travels well.

Most likely, whatever foods we have on hand is what our family will eat. Train your children while they are young and you can establish healthy habits that will last a lifetime. We develop their palate by what we feed them. If your family has already been trained to eat the empty filler foods, you can begin to change directions. Keep the empty filler foods out of sight and the health giving foods in sight and at hand. You can wean your children (and maybe yourself, too!) by allowing one or two options of the not so healthy items per week and/or decreasing it down gradually until you are providing only nutrient dense snacks with a treat on special occasions. By creating healthful habits now, our children may not have to deal with many of the common diet related diseases we are seeing today.

Try this for one month and next month we will look into another way of incorporating more healthy options into our life.

food for thought

I went Morel hunting today and found a big one! Ok, so I used a couple of half-truths to hook you in. I did go hunting for morels today, but I didn't find any. I have found some, but more on that later.

Morels are known to grow around my subdivision here at the lake. So this year I decided to get a little more serious in hunting them. I checked the internet for tips and clues. Best spot: at the base of newly dead or dying trees, it seems elms in particular. ...Check! No problem finding dying trees around my house. Best weather conditions: Day temps between 60-70 degrees and nights above 40. ...Check! Temps are looking good lately. Rain: A moderate amount, but not saturated soil. ...Well, may have to wait on that one. Bottom line: Around this time of year when the soil conditions are just right, you might luck out.

Morels are one of nature's greatest lessons in opportunity. There are a number of circumstances that have to line up to find these tasty little shrooms; weather, soil composition, and a growth cycle that seems to be somewhat cloaked in myth and legend. In addition, despite the best conditions, nothing will happen unless the spores are there to generate. Finding them depends on a whole lot of things beyond our control. All a person can do is understand the conditions as and make every effort to be at the right place at the right time. In other words; take advantage of the opportunity.

I see a great spiritual lesson in this. (*Go figure. I'm a pastor; I see spiritual lessons in everything!*) There was an evening when a renowned religious scholar named Nicodemus went to see Jesus. The Bible doesn't say why Nicodemus went to visit Jesus. Perhaps he was tired of simply studying about God and was ready for an encounter with Him.

The discussion turns to the idea of being "born again" and Nicodemus plays a little more mystified than I think he really was. Starting a new life in God was a concept the Jewish culture of the day understood well. As a matter of fact, if a person of another faith converted to Judaism, that person was said to be born anew. So deeply was that concept embedded that the individual was considered by the culture to be a different person. So complete was this rebirth that it was even argued that theoretically, the man could marry his own mother or sister!

However, Nicodemus continued to play dumb on the concept of spiritual rebirth so Jesus ends with a passage that is not easy to understand:

John 38. "The wind blows where it wishes, and you hear the sound of it, but cannot tell where it comes from and where it goes. So is everyone who is born of the Spirit."

This is where the Morel mushrooms come in. Any morel hunter knows you don't find them on your own terms. You become aware of the required conditions and you avail yourself of the opportunity. Simple diligence plays far more a part than any formula.

If we can't dictate the terms by which we encounter a mushroom, why would we think we can dictate our own terms to God? The world is full of people who say, "*God and I have an agreement...*" then they go on to expound on their arrangement with the Almighty; as if He mediates a new spiritual reality just for them. If anything, God says exactly the opposite. (*Matthew 7:21-25*) God is there, but we don't set the terms!

Oh yeah, one more thing on Morels. I did find a few biggies. It was the first year we moved to the Midwest. There they were, big as life at the end of our driveway. The problem was; we were new to the world of Morels. We had no real appreciation of the value or rarity of the opportunity before us. And so, we missed it. ...Now that I understand the conditions and the worth of Morels, I don't intend to let the next opportunity slip away so easily.

Jesus says the right conditions for finding God are hearts, minds and wills that are fully engaged in the search.

If nothing but the right conditions are needed to encounter a mushroom, why would we expect anything less when it comes to God? It all comes down to realizing those conditions and grabbing the opportunity. Anyway, it's certainly food for thought.

**The Clear Creek Conservancy District board of directors met
APRIL 21, 2011, at 10 a.m. at the district's office.**

Directors Present: Robert C. Hansen, Brian Waldman & J. Duane Kelly



Also attending: Kathy Deer, Administrative and Financial Manager; Doug Clodfelter, Plant Operator and Operations Manager & Jim Hazelwood.

Having received no comments opposing the proposed \$254,000 additional appropriation to use funds on hand to pay off the 2001 bonds, Robert Hansen moved to adopt Resolution 2011-4 approving the additional appropriation. Approved. Brian Waldman moved to approve the minutes of the March 17 meeting. Duane Kelly seconded. Vote unanimous.

Kathy Deer reviewed the financial report for the month ending March 31, 2011. Robert Hansen moved to approve the financial report and Register of Claims, dated March 18 through APRIL 21, 2011. Duane Kelly seconded. Approved.

Robert Hansen moved to adopt Resolution 2011-3 setting the July 1, 2011 through July 1, 2012 sewer connection fee at \$1,543.00. The district plan, as amended, determined the percentage change shall be equal to the amount of change in the CPI-U calculated by comparing the December rate of the immediately preceding year to the December rate for the prior year. That CPI-U increased by 1.5% for 2010 which increases the current fee by \$23.00. Approved.

Kathy Deer provided a written report. No certificates of deposit mature until July. On Saturday, March 19, Dennis Tennery of Avon damaged the lift station V2 when he drove his truck off the road and behind a guardrail. Mr. Tennery did not have insurance and the issue has been turned over to the district's insurance carrier. All time and costs are being documented to be turned over to the claims adjuster. The pager service for the beepers was cancelled. A cell phone with emergency phone number 765-721-6752 has been obtained and the message on the answering machine at the treatment plant has been updated to reflect this change in operation. More fiber optic cable damages were found at Patriots Landing 314/315 and PL 272/273. Invoice No. 13 for \$1,306.35 was mailed to Turn-Key Network Solutions on April 20. The Billing Summary Report shows 1,328 active accounts, the same as last month. The Feb/Mar billing statements were due April 15. Late charges of \$1,626.27 were added to 335 past due accounts. The bulk mail barcode changes have been delayed by the post office. There were 3,300 billing forms (9,900 bills) ordered at a cost of \$477.50. This supply will last about 7 billing cycles. The cost of first class postcards did increase by \$.01 this month. On March 29 there were 63 lien warning letters mailed to customers with sewer access fees owing in excess of \$200.00.

There are 50 lien documents prepared for lien filing later today.

A written request has been received by Sherry Bedwell to cancel sewer access fees to Mill Springs Lot 111. She state that the home burned more than a year ago and they do not plan to replace the home. After discussion, Robert Hansen moved to charge \$500.00 to discontinue service. The fee will reimburse the district the cost to dig up the lateral, cap and mark it at the easement. Duane Kelly seconded. Vote unanimous.

Doug Clodfelter provided a written report showing the average daily flow at 469,000 GPD and peak flow at 1,880,000 GPD for the month of March with 1.5 inches precipitation. The March 19 accident at LS V2 damaged the control panel. Mike Neese and Clint Anglin set up the district's diesel pump to use until Graves Plumbing was able to hook up a temporary control panel. The new control panel is still 4 weeks away from delivery. The OMNI-site monitor also is being replaced. The 25kw CAT generators for LS P2 and G5 have been delivered and are awaiting final connection and start-up. Jack Stokes made repairs to the sewer laterals found by Accurate Bore to have fiber optic cable in them. Repairs were made by Jack Stokes to a broken 45° fitting in the lateral at GB406 not caused by fiber optic lines. Another lateral repair at GB408 at about 18 ft. deep was attempted but will require a track-hoe and drier weather conditions. Because of the heavy rain, the manhole at GB41 overflowed again and a bypass overflow report was faxed to IDEM. Jim Smith of the Putnam County Highway Department has been contacted about the possibility of installing guardrail at LS G5. He had Bliss-McKnight, their Risk Management Team, look at the area and they did not think a guardrail was needed from the County's perspective. He did provide a quote from H.E. Anderson, Inc. for a 50-ft rail at \$2,238.12 but it is not yet known whether the County Commissioners will approve the installation of guardrail at this location.

Duane Kelly reported that the tour of the treatment plant for about 30 people is still scheduled for May 14 and will take place as planned if enough teachers sign up for the event.

The board set the next regular meeting for 10 a.m. on Thursday, May 19, 2011, at the district's office.
